Dr. Todd Allen is the Vice President for Diversity Affairs and a Professor of Communications at Messiah University. He is the Founder of the Common Ground Project, a community-based nonprofit dedicated to teaching and preserving the history of the Civil Rights Movement. Todd is a frequent lecturer on commemorative practices and public memory related to the Civil Rights Movement and is also a diversity and inclusive excellence trainer.

- **Selma** <u>Joanne Bland</u>, the co-founder and former director of the National Voting Rights Museum in Selma, who was a highly active participant in the Civil Rights Movement and was the youngest person to have been jailed during any civil rights demonstration during that period.

- Birmingham Either Rev. Dr. Carolyn McKinstry, who was a young girl/member of 16th Street Baptist Church at the time of the bombing and was friends with the girls killed. Or, Ms. Lisa McNair, who was born after the bombing but whose sister, Denise, was one of the girls killed.
- Memphis TM Garret, former Neo-Nazi and KKK leader turned human rights activist and founder of C.H.A.N.G.E, a Memphis-based non-profit organization which engages in community anti-racism and anti-violence campaigns and founder of The Memphis Peace Conference.
